TEACH-INS ABOUT ANTI-SEMITIC HATRED AND INTOLERANCE ON CAMPUS: A STUDENT GUIDE

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Introduction:

A rising tide of anti-Semitism is washing over America's campuses. From Northeastern to Vassar, from the University of Michigan to New York University, Jewish students have been engulfed by threats of violence, verbal harassment, ethnic slurs, character assassination, property destruction, defamatory accusations, gross cartoon caricatures reminiscent of the days of Hitler and other elements of a hostile campus environment. If this degradation targeted any other ethnic or religious minority, students and administrators would be up in arms, calling for disciplinary hearings, sensitivity training and the like. Yet campus authorities, typically known for their rush to accommodate campus minorities, have done little or nothing to protect the Jewish students under their charge.

Anti-Semitism on the March:

One doesn't have to look far to find examples of campus anti-Semitism in action. These incidents are especially common at our nation's most prestigious colleges and universities. Consider just a few recent cases:

At Rutgers University in New Jersey, a student organization called BAKA-Students United for Middle Eastern Justice which describes itself as "a proud affiliate of Students for Justice in Palestine" and which had attempted to illegally raise money for the Gaza flotilla in support of the terrorist group Hamas, held a "Never Again for Anyone" event that explicitly compared Israel to Nazi Germany. The event was advertised as "free and open to the public" but BAKA members decided on the spot to either deny admittance or charge an entrance fee to students and community members who "looked Jewish" and told some Jewish students "You don't belong here." One Jewish student who tried to cover the event had his camera grabbed. Another Jewish student who later spoke out against this discrimination was violently threatened on Facebook: "I'd be happy to see him beat with a crowbar. Violence doesn't solve problems but it shuts up people who shouldn't speak." Rutgers University policy bans discrimination on the basis of race, religion and national origin.

for Justice in Palestine sought to bar Jewish students from student government by demanding that candidates sign a pledge agreeing not to take trips to Israel sponsored by Jewish organizations such as the Anti-Defamation League and the American Jewish Committee. No corresponding pledge was required from students of any other faith. They hauled two Jewish students who had taken such trips before the student government Judicial Board—a

violation of the constitutional right free association—and to harassed a third student who refused to sign the pledge, using anti-Semitic cyberbullying and falsified screenshots of his Facebook account to show him stating, "I hate Muslims." Commenting on these incidents, UCLA Chancellor Gene Block said, "I am troubled that the pledge sought to delegitimize educational trips offered by some organizations but not others. I am troubled that the pledge can reasonably be seen trying to eliminate selected viewpoints from the discussion."

 At the University of Michigan Ann Arbor campus, an SJP front group calling itself Students Allied for Freedom and Equality (SAFE) launched a vitriolic campaign to urge the student government to boycott and divest from Israel. A Jewish member of the campus student government reported "anti-Israel and anti-Semitic hate speech" during its sessions Another Jewish student who opposed the BDS resolution listed the terms that had been slung at him and other members of the Jewish community at Michigan including "'Disgusting', 'filthy', 'shameful', 'dirty jew', 'kike,'" noting that these messages had been accompanied by "threats of violence." Meanwhile. the student government president reported that serious threats made to student government members had led them to fear going to class while the "Divestment Chair" of SJPfront group SAFE, Yazan Kherallah, posted a photo of himself with his face covered in a keffivah jamming a knife into a pineapple with the words. "It's on."

 At Vassar College, a newly created chapter of SJP targeted an International Studies class led by a Jewish Professor that was taking a planned trip to Israel in order to study negotiations on water resources by Israelis, Jordanians and Palestinians. SJP Vassar protesters harassed the class and handed out leaflets telling students that their "physical presence in the occupied country of Palestine" was an endorsement of Apartheid, and creating a literal picket line that students had to cross in order to go to class. SJP Vassar followed that up with a social media war against Jews and Israel featuring anti-Semitic quotes and a Nazi propaganda poster depicting a gigantic composite monster with an American flag flying on top and a Jewish Star of David dangling from the bottom. The poster was the last straw and finally triggered a belated Vassar investigation of it as a bias incident and forced the SJP chapter to unaffiliate from the College.

Students for Justice in Palestine: A Campus Hate Group

It is no accident that the common link in the above cases of violence, discrimination and harassment is the campus hate group, Students for Justice in Palestine (SJP).

Students for Justice in Palestine is a well-organized and well-financed festering hate group with chapters at over 150 universities. Its bigotry operates with the consent of administrators and faculty. Its speakers promote the murder of Jews and the denial of the Holocaust while their appearances are funded with student fees. Its chapters have been sanctioned and condemned for their bigoted activities, but no university has been willing to clearly and consistently denounce this hate group's presence on campus.

SJP was founded at UC-Berkeley in 2001 by then-Ph.D. candidate Hatem Bazian, who at the time was the head of Berkeley's Muslim Students Association, a Muslim Brotherhood front. Bazian had become notorious for his harassment of Jewish students at San Francisco State University where he had fought to bar Jewish students from student government, promoted an anti-Semitic mural and attacked the Jewish campus organization Hillel as well as Jewish students working at a student newspaper. Berkeley graduate student Snehal Shingavi joined Bazian in co-founding SJP. He later gained notoriety for teaching a controversial course titled "The Politics and Poetics of Palestinian Resistance." Explaining that his instruction would focus on "Israel's brutal oppression of Palestine since 1948," Shingavi in the course catalog urged conservative students not to bother registering for his class

The SJP chapters profiled above are not unique. They are only a snapshot of the larger experience of harassment and marginalization that Jewish and Israeli students are experiencing on campuses where SJP has established its presence. Students for Justice in Palestine claims that it is against Israel, rather than against Jews, and yet it attacks Jews based on ethnicity, religion and national origin.

SJP chapters have made it clear that they will not play by the rules. Their strategy is based on conflict and divisiveness. Sanctioning or suspending them only hands them another propaganda opportunity. They twist the truth and portray themselves as

victims, rather than the perpetrators of hatred on campus. Ignoring their bigotry, however, makes the campus into a dangerous environment for Jewish students.

No university would remain passive and silent if a KKK chapter promoted hatred of African Americans on campus. As we see in the recent events on the campuses described above, SJP is to Jewish and Israeli students not unlike what the KKK is to African-American students.

The first step in solving this problem is for universities to define SJP as a group that promotes hatred against Jews—by among other things, holding Jews to a different moral standard than any other country or group in the world. University administrators need to realize that hate groups have no place on campus. SJP supporters have the right to free speech. They do not have the right to promote bigotry, incite hatred on campus, and create a hostile learning environment, all with university funding. Hate groups like SJP should not be able to avail themselves of campus privileges and university funding.

Organizing to Fight Anti-Semitism on Campus

For far too long, SJP and its various affiliates and front-groups have been harassing and intimidating Jewish students on campus, violating federal civil rights law by creating a hostile environment for this religious and ethnic minority. As we have seen in the examples above, this "activism" goes well beyond opposing Israeli policy or "human rights violations" as SJP claims; rather it consists of the spread of defamatory malicious hate speech about the Jewish people and attacks on individual Jewish students who are forced to conduct their lives in fear because of SJP's tactics.

TruthRevolt creator Ben Shapiro recently gave an ardent account exposing the hypocrisy of SJP and its allies to a gathering of the student government at UCLA who had met to debate a motion to divest from Israel:

"To pretend that this anything other than vile, spiteful Jew hatred is a lie! There is only one reason we are discussing Israel and not discussing Saudi Arabia. There is only one reason we are discussing Israel and not discussing Iran. There is only one reason we are discussing Israel and not discussing Palestine. There is only one reason we are discussing Israel and not discussing the vast bevy of human rights violations that happen every day in the Middle East, exponentially worse that what happens in Israel... So, for us to sit here and pretend that Israel is somehow on a lower moral plane is a direct manifestation of anti-Semitism. And to hold Jews to a different moral standard than any other country or group on the face of the earth represents nothing but an ageold and historic hatred for the Jewish people."

This vile anti-Semitism cannot continue unchallenged and unabated on our university campuses. This spring, we are organizing to fight back. The David Horowitz Freedom Center has stepped into this breach to defend the rights of Jewish students to free speech, freedom of association and freedom from harassment for their religion and their views.

This campaign will include direct action to combat anti-Semitism on campus. We will be working with students across America to organize dozens of teach-ins during the weeks of April 6-24, during the spring 2015 semester. These teach-ins will target campus bigotry against Jews, expose SJP for the hate-group that it is, and make sure that college administrators treat it as such.

How to Get Started:

So you want to participate in this movement against campus anti-Semitism and take back your campus from the SJP zealots, but you're not sure what the next step is? Fortunately, it's easy. There are many ways you can participate in this movement—from bringing in speakers and hosting panel discussions to distributing literature, videos, or doing opposition research on your local SJP chapter. We are here to help you.

A campus teach-in can be shaped to fit any schedule and budget. Some campuses may choose to hold larger events such as hosting panel discussions or keynote speakers while others may simply set up an information booth to distribute literature or hold a film screening. Whatever your budget and schedule, we want to work with you and support you.

We are planning to hold dozens of teach-ins at campuses all across the country during the Spring 2015 semester. We hope to hold the majority of these events during the April 6-24 window so as to garner the maximum possible media attention, but if these dates don't work for you, you can still hold a teach-in at a time that works for your group. Join with this growing campus movement to hold SJP accountable for the Jew-hatred and bile they are leeching onto America's campuses and to make our campuses truly a place of safety and tolerance for all.

Ways to Participate:

1. Invite a Speaker:

We've compiled a dynamic roster of speakers who will tell the truth about campus anti-Semitism and SJP, and the agendas it stands for. Have another idea for a speaker? Call us and we can discuss it and see if we can make it happen.

Make sure to submit a formal request to your student activities office or student government to fund a speaker or teach-in on anti-Semitism on campus. A denial of your request for student activities funding—particularly if they have been used to fund anti-Semitic speakers in the past—could focus attention on the message of the teachins and might be used to generate publicity for the events themselves. If your organization does not have funds to bring in a keynote speaker, we have several low or no-cost ways to participate in the campaign including hosting a film screening and distributing literature on campus.

If your college or university denies this request despite funding hateful and anti-Semitic speakers in the past, you will have additional ammunition to use in your battle with the administration.

Possible speakers on Anti-Semitism on Campus:

Dr. Richard Cravatts

Dr. Richard Cravatts is the president of Scholars for Peace in the Middle East, an organization dedicated to assisting college faculty in developing effective responses to the ideological distortions—including anti-Semitic and anti-Zionist slanders—that poison debate and work against peace. His speeches explore the growing phenomenon of Israel-hatred and covert anti-Semitism on university campuses, which poses a fundamental threat to North American society.

Nonie Darwish

Nonie Darwish is an Egyptian-American human rights activist, founder of "Arabs for Israel," and is Director of "Former Muslims United." She is the author of Now They Call Me Infidel: Why I Renounced Jihad for America, Israel, and the War on Terror, Cruel and Usual Punishment: The Terrifying Implications of Islam-ic Law and The Devil We Don't Know: The Dark Side of Revolutions in the Middle East. She is the daughter

of an Egyptian Army lieutenant who was called a "shahid" by the Egyptian president Gamal Abdel Nasser after being killed by the IDF in 1956.

Jamie Glazov

Jamie Glazov is the editor of Frontpage Magazine, the David Horowitz Freedom Center's premier online news publication. He holds a Ph.D. in History with a specialty in Russian, U.S. and Canadian foreign policy. He is the author of the critically acclaimed and best-selling, *United in Hate: The Left's Romance with Tyranny and Terror.* His new book is *High Noon For America*. He also serves as the host of Frontpage's television show, *The Glazov Gang*.

David Horowitz

David Horowitz was one of the founders of the New Left in the 1960s and an editor of its largest magazine, *Ramparts*. In his memoir, *Radical Son* (1996), he traces his journey from red diaper baby to conservative activist. Horowitz has written numerous other books on topics ranging

from the leftist takeover of academia to the "unholy alliance" between Islamic jihad and the American left. He is the chairman and founder of the David Horowitz Freedom Center which is dedicated to the defense of free societies whose moral, cultural and economic foundations are under attack by enemies both secular and religious, at home and abroad.

Dr. Charles Jacobs

Dr. Charles Jacobs, named by the *Forward* as one of America's top 50 Jewish leaders, Jacobs has helped initiate several organizations and efforts that have become important Jewish and human rights assets:

- Charles partnered with Andrea Levin to found the Boston branch of CAMERA (Committee for Accuracy in Middle East Reporting in America) which became CAMERA's national office.
- 2. Throughout the 1990's, Charles' *American Anti-Slavery Group* brought international attention to the enslavement of Africans in Sudan by Islamist Khartoum regime. Charles flew -- *illegally* -- into South Sudan

severally times to help redeem thousands of African slaves from Arab masters. For this, he was presented with the first Boston Freedom Award by Mayor Thomas Menino and Coretta Scott King.

3. In 2002, Charles co-founded The David Project, which prepared students in over 100 Jewish high schools to make Israel's case on campus.

Today, Charles' Americans for Peace and Tolerance exposes and combats anti-Israel professors and text books on campuses and in high schools. Northeastern University dismissed three anti-Israel staff members after APT released its video exposes.

Morton Klein

Morton A. Klein is National President of the Zionist Organization of America which is dedicated to educating the public, elected officials, media, and college/high school students about the truth of the ongoing and relentless Arab war against Israel. Mr. Klein is widely regarded as one of the

leading Jewish activists in the United States. He is the child of Holocaust survivors and was born in a displaced persons camp in Gunzberg, Germany. The national Jewish weekly, "The Forward" named him one of the top five Jewish leaders in the US today. Klein is also an economist and served in the Nixon, Ford, and Carter Administrations. Klein has led successful initiatives protesting anti-Israel bias in textbooks, travel guides, universities, churches, and the media, and has also worked with legislators on Capitol Hill.

Dr. Eric Mandel

Dr. Eric Mandel is the founder and Director of MEPINTM, the Middle East Political and Information NetworkTM. MEPIN is a private Middle East research analysis read by members of Congress, their foreign policy advisors, members of the Knesset, journalists, and organizational leaders. Dr. Mandel regularly briefs members of Congress and their staffs about the current geopolitical situation in the Middle East. He meets with members of the Israeli leadership, their advisors, thinks tanks, and members of the PA.

He is the Northeast Co-Chair of StandWithUs, an international organization dedicated to educating the public about Israel, while fighting the BDS movement (Boycott, Divest and Sanction) against Israel. Dr. Mandel is a frequent speaker on university campuses. This year talks included Cornell, Columbia, PENN, and Brown among other colleges. Dr. Mandel is a regular columnist for the Jerusalem Post, writing about the US-Israel relationship, Iran, and the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

James O'Keefe

James O'Keefe is the Founder and President of Project Veritas, anon-profitorganization dedicated to developing a national network of effective and courageous undercover citizen journalists. O'Keefe's groundbreaking investigations have exposed corruption and malfeasance in major taxpayer-funded institutions, including ACORN, Planned Parenthood, public education, labor unions, NPR, Medicaid, Organizing for America, State Election Divisions, Obamaphones, and many other organizations. O'Keefe is also the author of *The New York Times* bestselling book *Breakthrough: Our Guerilla War to Expose Fraud*

and Save Democracy. He received the Robert Novak Award for Journalistic Excellence (2011), and was twice named "Fox News Power Player of the Week" twice by Chris Wallace, and was placed on the Forbes 30 under 30 for media moguls.

Daniel Pipes

Daniel Pipes is president of the Middle East Forum. His bi-weekly column appears regularly in the *Washington Times a*nd in newspapers around the globe, including the *Israel Hayom* (Israel), *La Razón* (Spain), *Liberal* (Italy), *National Post* (Canada), and the *Australian*. CBS Sunday Morning says Daniel Pipes was "years ahead of the curve in identifying the threat of radical Islam." He is the author of sixteen books on radical Islam, Syria and the Middle East

Ben Shapiro

Ben Shapiro is the creator and editorin-chief of TruthRevolt, a program of the David Horowitz Freedom Center. He is also editor-atlarge of Breitbart News. Shapiro is the *New York* Times bestselling author of Bullies: How the Left's Culture of Fear and Intimidation Silences America (2012), Primetime Propaganda: The True Hollywood Story of How the Left Took Over Your TV (2011) and Brainwashed: How Universities Indoctrinate America's Youth (2004), among others. 2. Demand a Response from Your Administration

If your campus has been targeted by SJP and its allies, now is the time to call them to account. We can help you. First, you can document SJP's activities. Check out the website of your local chapter and the quotes and links they display. Monitor their Facebook page as well as Twitter and Instagram accounts to see if their materials use

anti-Semitic icons like Nazi swastikas to defame Jews and Israel. Take screenshots of anything incriminating and compile a record that you can bring to your administration to demand action. Attend SJP and MSA events, take notes, and record them on video or audio. Again, we can help. Send us what you've done to Elisha@truthrevolt.org. We will help you and publicize what you find and can bring additional pressure to bear. Quotes and photos are your ammunition.

A coalition of pro-Israel organizations including the Freedom Center has recently sent a sobering letter to campus administrators and University trustees across the nation advising them of their legal obligations to protect the Jewish students under their charge. In this letter, the Coalition outlines the necessary steps campus administrations should take to ensure that Jewish students have a safe and non-hostile campus environment. Among these are such measures as ensuring that there is a clear mechanism for students to report harassment and intimidation, that anti-Semitic episodes are quickly dealt with and publicly condemned, and that all university personnel are educated in the U.S. government standards on anti-Semitism, so that they will

recognize when anti-Israelism and anti-Zionism cross the line into anti-Semitism.

Please follow-up on this letter with your campus administration, re-submit it to them if necessary, and ask that they meet with you to respond to its concerns and to the specific issues that Jews and supporters of Israel face on your campus.

3. Distribute Pamphlets

Reveal the truth about SJP's anti-Semitic agendas by distributing provocative and informative booklets to your campus community. Browse through the list of pamphlets below and order copies of any or all of them to be delivered to your mailbox for free. Then set up a table at a central location on campus (make sure you request the appropriate permits if necessary) and distribute literature to your fellow students. Make sure to have a camera with video capability on hand to record pictures and video of any heated exchanges or incidents.

The pamphlet most relevant to this campaign

is Daniel Greenfield's just-released work, Who is SJP? In Who Is SJP?. Greenfield provides the history and origins of the campus group Students for Justice in Palestine, exposing the Jew-hatred and bigotry which lie at the heart of SJP's mission. He also recounts SJP's leading role in the recent cluster of anti-Semitic incidents and hate speech at several prestigious college campuses, intimidating Jewish students and their supporters. In doing so, Greenfield provides crucial evidence that SJP qualifies as a hate group under the State Department's definition and therefore should have no place on a college campus. This pamphlet will serve as an invaluable resource for students organizing teach-ins against anti-Semitism on their own campuses who seek to expose the true nature of SJP and reverse the currents of anti-Semitism that plague our nation's institutions of higher learning.

4. Screen a film

Organizing a campus film screening is one of the most cost-effective ways to promote awareness of anti-Semitism on campus. A film screening can also provide the backdrop for a discussion of the issues showcased in the film and is a good occasion to distribute literature. Films available for screening are listed below.

Make sure to reserve a room equipped with the necessary audio-visual equipment and to publicize the screening through campus bulletin boards and social media

Possible films include:

Crossing the Line: The Intifada Comes to Campus

Crossing The Line is a powerful 30-minute film exposing the growing anti-Israel sentiment taking root on college campuses across North America. An sequel to this film, Crossing the Line II, will be released this winter and will also be available for campus screenings.

Beneath the Helmet: From High School to the Home Front

Beneath the Helmet is a coming of age story that highlights five young Israeli high school graduates, who are drafted into the army to defend their country. It illustrates how these young men and women are protecting not only their homes, but

the shared values of peace, equality, opportunity, democracy, religious tolerance and women's rights. The lessons they learn along the way, are lessons that can be adapted, understood and appreciated by everyone.

You may also screen several shorter videos on campus anti-Semitism which are available online and conduct a discussion afterwards. If you do this, make sure that you have the appropriate audio-visual equipment to play online videos on a larger screen. Good videos to consider for this purpose are:

5. Stunts

Anti-Semitic campus organizations have long used theatrical performance and reenactment to draw attention to their causes. Students for Justice in Palestine and the Muslim Students Association regularly set up mock "checkpoints" in which students dressed as Israeli soldiers harass and arrest those impersonating Palestinians, hold "die ins" on college quads, or target Jewish students with mock "eviction notices" delivered to their dorms.

While these protests are misleading and based on easily refuted lies, the theatrical tactics used are highly effective at garnering attention and relaying a message. So we're going to borrow a leaf from their book and illustrate the brutal treatment of women, homosexuals and others who are accused of crimes such as "homosexuality" or "adultery" in areas controlled by Hamas and the Palestinian Authority and neighboring Arab/Muslim countries. To highlight Israel's comparatively

stellar record on human rights, we encourage you to hold a mock hanging, mock stoning or mock whipping on your campus.

Important Note: If you want to participate in one of these theatrical protests, it is essential that you first contact Elisha Kraus at Elisha@truthrevolt. org. The Freedom Center will provide you with the materials to carry out these protests, but students must follow the rules and guidelines provided to ensure their safety and the maximum effectiveness of these protests.

Mock Hangings:

As you may be aware, Iran, among other Islamic countries, punishes homosexuality with the death penalty and hangs those convicted of the offense from cranes. Instead of targeting this horrific violation of human rights, SJP instead focuses its animus on Israel, the only liberal democracy in the Middle East and the only nation in this region to protect civil rights including those of homosexuals. Staging a mock hanging on your campus will expose SJP's hypocrisy.

Students can produce a dummy dressed in

normal attire with a rope around his neck. A sign on him will read "I'm a gay Iranian and SJP doesn't care about me." If you cannot produce a dummy, contact the Freedom Center and we will help you.

A minimum of 4 students are needed.

1 student to hold the dummy

1 student to help

1 student recording their team

1 student to record the crowd

Students staging a mock hanging must follow these rules:

- Wear plain clothes (no logos, political shirts, bright colors)
- No chanting, yelling or talking
- Do not engage in debate or arguments

Mock Stonings or Mock Whippings:

Many Islamic nations (including Iran,

Afghanistan, and Saudi Arabia among others) punish adultery either with 100 lashes of the whip (for unmarried adulterers) or with death by stoning (for married adulterers). As with the hangings of homosexuals, SJP and other anti-Israel hate groups completely ignore these hideous abuses of human rights while condemning Israel.

To enact a mock stoning, create a large placard which can be hung around the neck of one of the participants from your group that reads "I'm a woman accused of adultery and SJP doesn't care about me." Then create mock stones out of lightweight materials such as balled up newspapers, paper mache, or Styrofoam balls. One member of your group should wear the placard while the others throw the "stones" at her as she gradually falls to the ground and perishes. You can re-enact this scene more than once at regular intervals over the course of an hour or two.

To enact a mock whipping, use the same basic set-up but instead of throwing stones have one member of your group "whip" the person wearing the placard with a mockwhip (this can be a black ribbon attached to a stick or can be made from strips of black trash bags which are braided to

better resemble a leather whip.

Holding Multiple Events

Some student organizers will be eager to host several of these suggested events on campus, combining them into a week-long teach-in program. Others may feel that their time only permits one or two activities. Whatever your schedule and budget, we encourage you to participate to the extent that you are able. Even hosting a film screening or distributing literature will challenge the ethos that permits Jew-hatred on campus.

Media Exposure and Funding:

To ensure that your activism gets the greatest media exposure and attention possible, we strongly encourage you to appoint a communications director/press secretary whose job it will be to attract campus and local media attention for your teach-in.
